Areas of focus

- Study the relation between adequate housing, economic, social and cultural rights, and civil and political rights, using non-discrimination and security of tenure as a general framework;
- Monitor the realisation of rights relevant to the mandate and legal and political developments in this regard and provide practical and concrete solutions aimed at the realisation of the right to adequate housing;
- Develop dialogue and cooperation with States, United Nations and other intergovernmental bodies, international financial institutions and civil society organisations;
- The right to adequate housing is a component of the right to an adequate standard of living and relates to issues of legal security of tenure; availability of services, materials, facilities and infrastructure; affordability; habitability; accessibility; location; and cultural adequacy.
