- Monitor and inquire into attacks on the independence of the judiciary, lawyers and court officials, as well as follow progress achieved in protecting and enhancing their independence;
- The terms of reference of the mandate include the structural and functional aspects of the judiciary and cover both civil and military justice, ordinary and exceptional jurisdictions and developments related to the International Criminal Court;
- The terms of reference have also been extended to other issues such as the right to truth, transitional justice and the problems posed by terrorism in relation to the administration of
- The legal framework includes the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the Basic Principles on the Independence of the Judiciary, the Basic Principles on the Role of Lawyers, and the Guidelines on the Role of Prosecutors.
